1.1 Introduction

This chapter provides an overview of the HS1MM/HS2MM server processor memory option, and lists preinstallation instructions and considerations.


1.2 Memory Capacity

The server processor can support from 64 megabytes to 512 megabytes of memory. Memory options consist of five single in-line memory modules (SIMMs) and are available in the following variations:

- HS1MM 64-megabyte memory option consists of five 16-megabyte SIMMs. An HS1xx server processor fully populated with 16-megabyte SIMMS contains 256 megabytes of memory capacity.
- HS2MM 128-megabyte memory option consists of five 32-megabyte SIMMs. An HS1xx server processor fully populated with 32-megabyte SIMMS contains 512 megabytes of memory capacity.

The motherboard of the server processor has a total of 20 SIMM connectors. The SIMM connectors are grouped into four memory banks (0, 1, 2, and 3) and one error correction code (ECC) SIMM connector for each bank of memory. Memory layout is shown in Figure 1-1.

NOTE

When upgrading the server processors of the HS121, you must upgrade the memory of each server processor equally.

1.3 Preparing to Install a SIMM

To prepare the server processor to install a SIMM, you need to assemble the required equipment and familiarize yourself with antistatic precautions.

1.3.1 Required Equipment


You need the following equipment:

- Flat-blade screwdriver
- Phillips screwdriver
- Antistatic wrist strap

1.3.2 Attach the Antistatic Wrist Strap

Static electricity can damage electronic components. Before you handle internal system components, attach the antistatic wrist strap to your wrist and to the system unit as shown in Figure 1–2.

Caution

Do not disconnect the system unit power cord or unplug the power cord from the power supply socket. The power cord grounds the system, preventing damage to the internal components.

Removing and Installing SIMMs

You may need to install a new SIMM to replace a faulty module or to upgrade a memory bank. You may need to remove SIMMs to access the memory slots for any new modules. This chapter describes how to remove and install SIMMs, and verify memory configuration.

2.1 Complete Preinstallation Tasks

Make sure you have completed all the preinstallation activities described in Chapter 1 before removing and installing a SIMM.


2.2 Connect a Terminal to the Server Processor

Note

You must have a console terminal connected to the FDDI Server's server processor to complete the installation procedures described in this chapter. If you have a terminal already connected, proceed to Section 2.3. If you do not have a terminal connected, follow the procedure below. Any terminal that supports ANSI control sequences can be used, including graphics displays that provide emulation of an ANSI-compatible video terminal.

1. Make sure the power switch on the back of the terminal is OFF (○).
2. Connect one end of the terminal cable to the back of the terminal.
3. Using a 5/32-inch hex wrench, open the back door of the FDDI Server cabinet.
4. Connect the other end of the terminal cable to the EIA terminal port on the rear of the server processor using the female MMJ adapter (part number H8571-J) as shown in Figure 2-1.
5. Turn the terminal power switch to ON (⊐).
6. Set the terminal at 9600 baud, with 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, and no parity. Refer to your terminal documentation for terminal setup instructions.

2.3 Shut Down the System

1. Stop all work on the server processor in which the SIMM is to be installed.
2. Perform an orderly shutdown of the operating system in the server processor by typing the following command at the DCL \$ prompt on the terminal connected to the server processor:

```
$ @SYS$SYSTEM:SHUTDOWN
```

3. When shutdown is complete, open the front door of the FDDI Server cabinet with a 5/32-inch hex wrench and depress the power button on the server processor Operator Control Panel (OCP) to turn off power.


2.4 Slide the Server Processor Out of the FDDI Server Cabinet

Now that your system is shut down, and both doors of the FDDI Server are open, perform the following steps:

1. Remove the red shipping brackets that hold the server processor in place.
2. Slide the processor out of the back on its slides, to enable you to easily access the rear top cover.

3. Loosen all the screws on the rear top cover using a Phillips screwdriver (see Figure 2-2).
4. Lift off the rear top cover.

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2.5 Remove and Replace SIMMs in the Correct Order

It is recommended that SIMMs be removed and installed only in successive order, to prevent damage to SIMMs adjacent to the ones you want to remove. For example, if you have SIMMs already installed in Banks 1, 2, and 3, and you want to remove a SIMM from Bank 0, follow this process:

1. Remove SIMMs in Bank 3.
2. Remove SIMMs in Bank 2.
3. Remove SIMMs in Bank 1.
4. Remove the SIMM you need to remove in Bank 0.

Refer to Figure 1–1 for clarification of the SIMM configuration on the motherboard. Figure 2–3 shows the removal procedure for a SIMM.

WARNING

Memory and CPU modules have parts that operate at high temperatures. Wait two minutes after power is removed before handling these modules.


1. Remove the SIMMs by pressing the metal clips on both sides of the SIMM connector to the side. (See callout 1 in Figure 2–3.)

Note

You may want to use a screwdriver to press back on the metal clips, but be very careful not to damage the motherboard.

2. Note the position of any SIMMs you remove.
3. Tilt the memory module and lift it out of its connector. (See callout 2 in Figure 2–3.)
4. Replace the SIMM and any others you may have removed in the reverse order from the above procedure. (See Section 2.6.3.)

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2.6 Add and Install SIMMs

2.6.1 Before You Install SIMMs

Before you install SIMMs, check the following:

- Make sure you have completed all the preinstallation tasks described in Chapter 1 before installing a SIMM.
- Make sure you shut down the system as described in Section 2.3 before installing a SIMM.

2.6.2 Check the Rules for Installing a Memory Option

Observe the following rules when installing SIMMs for the memory option:

- Bank 0 must contain a memory option. A memory option consists of 5 SIMMs: 0, 1, 2, and 3, and 1 error correction (ECC) SIMM.
- When you install a memory option in a memory bank, you must install a SIMM in all of the connectors in that bank.
- All SIMMs within a bank must be of the same memory capacity.
- It is recommended that larger SIMM groups occupy the lower-numbered banks.
- Observe the rules and recommendations regarding the procedure for removing and installing SIMMs (see Section 2.5).

2.6.3 Install SIMMs


If you first need to remove a SIMM from the bank into which you want to install one, refer to Section 2.5 for the correct procedure.

WARNING

Memory and CPU modules have parts that operate at high temperatures. Wait 2 minutes after power is removed before handling these modules.

1. Tilt the connecting end of the module and press gently on the module so it slips into the two posts located at each end of the slot. (See callout 1 in Figure 2-4.)
2. Snap the SIMM into place in the correct upright position, as shown in Figure 2-4. Make sure that the SIMM is fully seated. The two latches on the ends of each SIMM connector should lock around the edges of the SIMM. (See callout 2 in Figure 2-4.)
3. Install all SIMMs using this same procedure, including any you removed for access.

2.7 Replace the Server Processor in the FDDI Server Cabinet

When you have finished removing and installing all the SIMMs, and you are ready to close the server, perform the following steps:

1. Reinstall top rear cover on the server processor.
2. Depress the slide locks and slide server processor back into your FDDI Server.
3. Reinstall the red shipping brackets on the rear of the FDDI Server cabinet.
4. Close and lock the rear door.

2.8 Power Up the Server Processor

1. Depress the power button on the server processor OCP to power up the server processor.
2. Close the front door of the FDDI Server.
3. Press the RETURN key on the FDDI Server console terminal connected to the server processor.

2.9 Verify the Memory Configuration

Before booting your system, you should verify the memory configuration using the following command:

```
>>> SHO MEM
```

Example 2-1 Show Memory Command

```
>>>SHO MEM
    128 Meg of System Memory
    Bank 0 = 64 Mbytes(16 MB Per Simm) Starting at 0x00000000
    Bank 1 = 64 Mbytes(16 MB Per Simm) Starting at 0x04000000
    Bank 2 = No Memory Detected
    Bank 3 = No Memory Detected

>>>CONT
```

The Show Memory Command

The show memory command displays information for each memory module in the system. The command and a sample display are shown in Example 2-1.

2.10 Boot Your System

When you have successfully completed the installation of the SIMM upgrade memory option, you should boot your system by typing **BOOT** at the **>>>** prompt.
